For the record, I am a fairly new member of the Guild of One Names Studies, number 8001, for Carpenter. My study is *mostly North American Centric*.

I run the **Carpenter Cousins Project** which started out as the Carpenter CD Project back in the mid to late 1990s. I published a two CD set in 2001 then a few updates after that. I also started a Carpenter Cousins Y-DNA Project in 2002 after a Carpenter Family meeting in Florida.

As a side note, I am a former US Army veteran and a retired peace officer from San Diego County.

Before Covid-19, I taught genealogy, family history, genetic genealogy and DNA classes for over a dozen years. I was also a shift supervisor at the local Family History Center. I have also been involved with various research projects and investigative genetic genealogy efforts.

My Guild study is part of the **Carpenter Cousins Project** just like the Carpenter Cousins Y-DNA Project, the Carpenter Sketches and the Carpenter-1-Name Project for all types of DNA testing. We are also on Facebook and a Google based email forum.

Today the Carpenter Cousins Project is the genealogical, research and support for surnames sounding like Carpenter, Carpentier, Charpentier und Zimmerman(n). Zimmerman(n) is old German for the English word Carpenter. Many, but not all, of those who immigrated to North America anglicized their surnames to the English versions like

Over the last many years many corrections has been made to these and other Carpenter lines. This using good research and documentation combined with Y-DNA genetic genealogy testing via genetic genealogy triangulation.

It has made a difference.

We use an image, similar in design to a Coat of Arms, to represent the Carpenter Cousins Project. It was designed by **Terry Lee Carpenter** in 1997 and colorized by me. Naturally, it is used with his kind written permission.

Carpenter Cousins is North American centric and is quirky as such!

The Carpenter Cousins Y-DNA (surname) Project has **39 organized groups**, one semiorganized group based on Haplogroup R with SNP M269 and one catch all group for other non-genetic matches.


Here is a quick statistical project summary.

The main genealogical database has 216,000 names.

We have **69 Carpenter Cousins books** digitized, along with **65 articles** which does not include some **300 Wikipedia articles** that were written, updated, et cetera on Carpenter Cousins.

Today, we have 458 FTDNA Y-DNA members and 35 others from other DNA testing companies. This is a total of **493 members**.

Our newer catch all DNA Project, called the Carpenter-1-Name project has 93 members.



The largest Carpenter Cousins Y-DNA Project group is **Group 3 representing descendants of the William Carpenter who came to America in 1638.** He settled in Rehoboth, Massachusetts. We have some 81,939 descendants documented. Group 3 has 66 members who are **genealogically and genetically related** and 27 **genetically related but not connected genealogically**.

I am FTDNA number 5734 in Group 3.

I have had my Y-DNA tested to 111 Y-STR markers. This in addition to my full Mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA), Autosomal DNA (atDNA) and CODIS markers. I also upgraded to the Big Y-700 SNP series with additional Y-STR to my terminal SNP, at this time, as ... Haplogroup R1a1a1b1a3c~?? Which is defined by SNP BY146444. The FTDNA shorthand code is **R-BY146444**.



If that was not nerdy enough, here is the January 2021 report file. It shows 9.90 Gigabytes of data in 312 folders and 9,721 files.

ALL of this Carpenter Cousins effort was not done by me alone.

I am just the compiler.

When I published my two CD set in 2001 aka CE CD 2001 – I credited 794 people with making that possible. Most of whom I had never met face to face.

Today that number is way over five fold more.

For example ...


I use credit tags for submitters in the genealogy.

I currently have two great co-administrators for the Carpenter Cousins Y-DNA Project. One previous admin member is now deceased and another resigned for health reasons. And there are many other contributing members of the Carpenter Cousins Team!

One is **John F. Chandler** PhD whose wife is a Carpenter by birth. He is a semiretired astrophysicist from MIT. He is our **DNA Guru** and does the same for a half a dozen other DNA projects.

The other is **Terry Lee Carpenter** our Project *Southern Carpenter expert*. He is an USAF Major retired. He also worked at the National DAR as an investigator. Now he is a contractor working back at the Pentagon.

I also have had many individual genealogical researchers who as part of the various groups have combined efforts, money and time to better document and build the data

needed for *OUR* genealogy. And they have allowed me to help compile and focus their efforts.

One in particular stands out. **Eugene Coles Zubrinsky**, "Gene" is a master genealogist and is a *Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists*. He is a retired professor and an excellent genealogical writer and researcher. He has written many scholarly articles on various genealogical subjects.

Thankfully some of those articles were on Carpenters!

And his *12 Carpenter Sketches* is the *best scholarly effort* on the two William Carpenters immigrants from 1635 & 1638 along with their extended families.

Genealogy, Family History, Genetic Genealogy & One Name Studies are most successful when engaged by teamwork and cooperation!
